

Santa Maria delle Grazie




Milan, one of the most important cities in Italy has so much to offer the world. One of such landmarks is the Santa Maria Delle Grazie or Holy Mary of Grace church.








Burial Site

Duke Ludovico Sforza, one of the sons of members of the Sforza family decided to have the church as the family burial site. For this reason, he had the cloister and the apse of the church rebuilt and the project was completed in 1490. His wife, Beatrice was buried there in 1497.
